In Kenya where we are and in the areas we serve, the holiday doesn't bring to mind lights, shopping, nor even Jesus sadly. What happens is people try to get whatever they can to buy a little extra for their meal on Christmas day....they want to feel "normal" (however you define that). When you live in a 10x6 metal shed, sleep on a mud floor where insects crawl on you and you are watching for snakes, eat cooked weeds, and can't get your child in school because you can't afford the fees of the "free education", and now you are "expected" to do something special with your kids and you simply do not have the resource, then Christmas becomes kind of depressing and a burden. Now am not trying to bring you down so you won't enjoy your celebration, but I want to tell you the truth which is in many parts of the world, there is not enough money to just "do life" and Christmas turns into an event where people will resort to anything to get money for Christmas. They vandalize the electrical service to steal the fluids in the transformers to sell to get money for Christmas (which puts communities in the dark for days). The crime rate goes up as people will accost others to get money for Christmas (even people who would not normally do such a thing). You use money you have been given for January fees for your kids to be in school so you end up begging for funds two weeks after Christmas. Packages from the post office are stolen to get stuff for Christmas...Happy Birthday Jesus. The pull and urge to be "like everyone else", even in poverty stricken countries, is a hard haul...especially if you have kids who don't understand why others have chapatti for a meal (a special treat for Kenyans) at Christmas and you don't have anything. First, we have made our goal for feeding the kids we serve during the holiday with the special meal of chapatti. This will be so exciting for them. It will make the day special and one they will remember. They will be told and shown God loves them and sent His Son to save them. Thank you for everyone who assisted in this endeavor. We also had people contribute to buy another cow (which was on the list). Now this made me very excited until one of our cows died and so instead of increasing our stable, we simply replaced it with the donated funds. I am so grateful for this contribution, but now we still are looking for the "final" cow. So, if you would like to help us in this self (God) sustaining project, please remember us with your holiday giving.The projects I listed in the Christmas list are not yet funded (finishing the study areas for the kids and getting a table tennis game). If you are in a position which can help us get this done I would appreciate the support. Lastly was a gift for the employees of C4KK (the children's home we run in Kenya). They are paid what we can on a monthly basis (ranging from \$100 to \$250/month - good money for Kenya), but to give them a little extra to allow them to celebrate Christmas with their families would be appreciated.
